COMPREHENSIVE STATE SCHOLARSHIP/GRANT PROGRAMS

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN PROGRAM/OPERATIONS* BY STATE

1970-71 to 1971-72 Award Years

CALIFORNIA

- (1) Public Service Internship Program is currently unfunded
- (2) Age limit of 24 waived for military veterans in Scholarship Program
- (3) No age limitation for applicants to College Opportunity Grant Program
- (4) College Opportunity Grant applicants must not have completed more than 16 units of college study (any college study previously disqualified)

CONNECTICUT

- (1) Restricted Educational Achievement Grant Program provides that primary consideration be given to potentially capable students whose educational achievement has been or is being restricted by economic, social or environmental disadvantages. Used only at Connecticut institutions. Colleges and universities recommend students for consideration. (reported last year as a categorical award - now appears to be otherwise)
- (2) Awards to children (ages 16-23, inclusive) of deceased or disabled veterans have been added to agency responsibilities
- (3) Funds for undergraduate scholarships caused a cut from 800 to 240 for new freshmen awards.

FLORIDA

- (1) Regents Scholarships funded at a level sufficient to make only renewal award
- (2) Categorical awards not based upon need (Teaching and Nursing) to be phased out - no new awards after July 1, 1971
- (3) Increased funding for State Loan Program with loans based on financial need. Loan fund is a state revolving fund.

ILLINOIS

- (1) Applicants with permanent resident visa now qualify for monetary award consideration
- (2) Hospital Schools of Nursing will qualify as eligible institutions for 1972-73 awards
- (3) All 1971-72 announced awards were reduced by 4% to permit the assistance of additional needy applicants within the known appropriation
- (4) Teacher Education awards (no need assessment) are being phased out after December 31, 1971 (no new awards)

INDIANA

- (1) Educational Grant Program enacted into law
- (2) Students at Hospital Schools of Nursing are not eligible for assistance

IOWA

(no changes)

KANSAS

- (1) State Board of Education (responsible for Scholarship Program) is now elected (previously appointed)
- (2) Awards continue to be applicable only to undergraduate freshmen and sophomores

MARYLAND

- (1) Teacher Education Scholarships are being phased out

MASSACHUSETTS

(no changes)

MICHIGAN

(no changes)

MINNESOTA

- (1) Grant Program given the authority of statute
- (2) Award limits now \$100 to \$1,000
- (3) Award now one-half demonstrated need not to exceed the maximum award
- (4) No age limitation - those 25 years or older before commencing education were previously disqualified
- (5) Entitlement period of eight semesters or twelve quarters no longer limited to five year period
- (6) Junior college transfers to senior institutions now eligible to apply as a first-time applicant

NEW JERSEY

(no changes)

NEW YORK

- (1) Graduate Fellowships are being phased out in 1971-72

OHIO

(no changes)

OREGON

- (1) Nonpublic college grant program has been repealed and a direct aid program administered by the commission has replaced it.
- (2) Need/Grant and Community College Grant Programs are new programs
- (3) Fee remission programs at public colleges are now in phase-out

PENNSYLVANIA

- (1) Honorary awards are no longer conferred
- (2) Need is respective total college costs less parental contributions. Maximum award is \$1,200 in-state and \$800 out-of-state. Fifty percent of need is met for family incomes less than \$8,000 - 33 1/3 percent of need if family income is \$8,000 or above.

RHODE ISLAND

- (1) Students are assisted in Hospital Schools of Nursing

VERMONT

- (1) Honor scholarships (no need awards) are no longer offered

WASHINGTON (not in 1970-71 study)

- (1) Has both a State Need Grant Program and a Tuition Supplement Grant Program (only for those attending Washington private institutions)
- (2) No honorary awards conferred
- (3) No awards are applicable at Hospital Schools of Nursing
- (4) Need Grant Program has no maximum - is 1/3 difference between college budget and total family contribution
- (5) Tuition Supplement Program has \$90 maximum award

WEST VIRGINIA

- (1) Commission on Higher Education has been dissolved and its functions assumed by West Virginia Board of Regents
- (2) Agency also administers an Educational Awareness Talent Search Project

WISCONSIN

- (1) Teachers' Scholarships and Stipends for Teachers of the Handicapped have been merged into Educational Manpower Grants
- (2) Indian Student Assistance program added to the agency
- (3) The \$100 honorary scholarship (regardless of need) eliminated in 1971-72. Those previously qualifying for only \$100 to receive honorary certificate
