SELF-SUPPORTING STUDENT DEFINITIONS

(States with SSIG funded and operational programs 1974-75*)

*States not reporting: Minnesota, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico, South Dakota, Trust Territories, Virgin Islands

CALIFORNIA 1. Must not have lived with either parent nor received financial assistance exceeding \$200 from either parent for five consecutive years prior to September 1 of the next academic year, and not claimed as an income tax exemption for the same period of time by anyone other than self or spouse. 2. Have been a ward of the court (in which case appropriate court documents must be submitted). 3. Be an orphan and not claimed as a tax dependent during the current tax year by any person other than self or spouse. 4. Have been a part of an extremely adverse (home) situation which is documented and supported by school or responsible community personnel (minister, social worker, etc.) which leads to estrangement from the student's family and under circumstances where the student has not received a contribution in cash or in kind from his family for the preceding 12 months. In instances where an applicant does not meet 1-4 above, and the parents refuse to provide their financial information, the student cannot be considered for an award.

COLORADO Same definition as that used for federal programs.

CONNECTICUT State Scholarship Higher Education Grant, and College Continuation Programs: a student financially independent of his parents or legal guardians. Restricted Educational Achievement Grants: must come from a poverty background and due to circumstances forced to be self supporting.

DELAWARE Parents' sworn affidavit that student is independent and not taken as an exemption on income tax returns.

FLORIDA Follow federal guidelines.

GEORGIA Student who did not or will not reside with, receive \$600 or more in support from, or be claimed as an income tax exemption by anyone other than himself (or spouse) during the current or immediately preceding calendar year.

IDAHO Not defined in the law, rules or regulations but probably CSS definition.

ILLINOIS In Illinois 6 months other than as full-time student and has not lived with or been claimed on federal income tax forms by parents for calendar year prior to applying, the year applying, and the year of the award.

INDIANA Follows federal definition.

IOWA Not claimed by parents or guardian as income tax exemption for 2 years prior to year in which award is to be used and will not be so claimed for award year; has not lived in parents' home for 12 months prior to application (unless reasonable room and board are paid) and has not received any financial aid from his parents for this period.

KANSAS Federal program definition.

KENTUCKY Follow BEOG program.

MAINE A student either married or 18 who has not been dependent on his parents for last income reporting year.

MARYLAND A student who files a SCS instead of a PCS.

MASSACHUSETTS Single self-supporting students under 25 years of age must not be claimed as tax exemptions by their parents for the previous 2 consecutive years.

MICHIGAN Not claimed by parents as an exemption on previous years' Federal Income Tax return; maintained separate residence apart from parents for previous 12 months; not received more than \$500 in support from parents during previous 12 months.

MINNESOTA Did not report. Previous years reported "follows federal guidelines".

MISSOURI 1. A. Not claimed as tax dependent 1973 or 1974 tax year (other than self). B. Has not lived with nor received more than \$600 in financial assistance from family or guardian in 1973 or 1974. 2. Veteran. 3. Ward of state of Missouri. 4. Orphan.

NEW JERSEY Educational Opportunity Fund: has not resided during the 12 months preceding application with parent/guardian and has not nor will be claimed as an exemption (excluding spouse), and has not nor will receive financial assistance of more than \$200 per year (food, clothing, shelter) in the calendar year in which aid is received or the calendar year prior. All other New Jersey programs except Tuition Permission Program (not reported): age 23 or older, not claimed as a dependent on the previous years' tax return, not lived at home and parents do not contribute to educational expenses. (This means that he must show how he supported himself during past year.) This self-supporting definition currently being reviewed.

NEW YORK If during the calendar year next preceding the term for which application for an award is made, and during the entire period of such term, such student: 1. has not resided with parents for more than two consecutive weeks, and 2. has not received in any calendar year financial assistance or support in excess of \$600 from parents; and if during the parents' taxable year next preceding the term for which application for an award is made, such student has not been claimed as a dependent by either parent for purposes of either Federal or State income tax.

NORTH DAKOTA Similar to that used for federal programs.

OHIO 12-month financial independent status in terms of financial support, federal income tax purposes, and residency.

OREGON Must be able to answer "no" to all questions on item #7 as well as item #11 of Student's Financial Statement. Evidence may be presented to prove independence in exceptional cases when criteria cannot be met.

PENNSYLVANIA All Veterans of U.S. armed forces. Non-veterans must be graduated from high school 6 years or more; if not, extenuating circumstances are considered on an individual basis.

RHODE ISLAND One who is not declared as a tax dependent by his parents.

SOUTH CAROLINA Not claimed on parents' income tax form(s) as dependent. Did not receive more than \$600 support last year from parents. Did not live with parents last year.

TENNESSEE USOE guidelines; will likely adopt guidelines for BEOG program.

TEXAS Same as for Federal Insured Loan Program.

VERMONT Has not been claimed or will not be claimed as an exemption for Federal Income Tax purposes by either parent or any other person (except spouse) for either the calendar year in which aid is received or the 2 prior calendar years; has not received or will not receive financial assistance of more than \$200 including room and board of any kind from one or both parents or from persons acting in loco parentis in either the calendar year in which aid is received or the 2 prior calendar years. A student is considered to have received more than \$200 in assistance if he or she has resided with his or her parents for a period of 1 month or longer. A student whose parents or others acting in loco parentis have died within the period discussed above is eligible for consideration as a self-supporting student even if the tests are not met. Two specified kinds of documentation for self-supporting student status are required.

VIRGINIA Federal definition.

WASHINGTON 1. Student will not be and has not been claimed as an income tax deduction by anyone other than spouse for calendar year of award and prior calendar year; 2. Will not receive and has not received financial assistance of more than \$600 in cash or kind from parents in calendar year and prior calendar year. 3. Will not live and has not lived with parents except during limited vacation periods during the calendar year and prior calendar year unless the student reimburses the parents for at least room and board.

WEST VIRGINIA Has not been or will not be claimed as exemption by parents or guardians. Has not received or will not receive financial assistance of more than \$600 from parents or guardians; has not or will not maintain residence with parents except during vacation periods.

WISCONSIN Tuition Grant Program: If student and/or spouse provided majority of own support in preceding calendar year. Other Wisconsin programs: not claimed by parents as tax exemptions in previous calendar year.
