Beginning with the 1974-75 academic year, the federal State Student Incentive Grant Program (SSIGP) provided funds to assist in the establishment of new, and the expansion of, existing State Student Scholarship/Grant Programs based upon financial need for at least half-time study in undergraduate programs.

Growth represented in '74-'75, '75-'76, and '76-'77 in the historical summary table above, to a large degree, is a response to the new SSIG Program which permits up to a \$1,500 annual student award (equal shares of \$750 Federal/State) in this new form of State/Federal partnership.

ALASKA: '76-'77 computerized data system. '77-'78 computerized data system and coordinated with other sources. ARKANSAS: No changes for '76-'77. '77-'78 anticipating legislative/budgetary actions. CALIFORNIA: In '76-'77 data processing payment system. Use of common application for the Scholarship, College Opportunity Grant, and Occupational Education and Training Grant Programs. In '77-'78 awards will be granted to part-time students. Also, a Master-Data Processing File is being planned. COLORADO: '76-'77: None; '77-'78: We will develop a new basis for allocating funds among the eligible institutions. CONNECTICUT: There will be a decrease in emphasis on out-of-state contractual services and a greater emphasis on in-state administrative services.

DELAWARE: '76-'77: Cross-tab of other financial assistance. '77-'78: Considering a change in real estate market value in parents assets. Considering new demonstration of self-support for emancipated applicants.

FLORIDA: '76-'77: BEOG indexes are printed on award rosters and copies of awards letters. Both ACT and CSS need analysis services were used; '77-'78: BEOG application will be required as a condition of State award consideration. Will discontinue use of over-printed need analysis statements that list the Florida Dept. of Educ. GEORGIA: Program coverage was extended from freshman and sophomore level students to junior level students. An August 15 deadline filing date was established. Minor changes were made in individual institutional budgets due to changes in tuition charges, cost of living, etc. Hope to obtain funds to extend the GIS program to senior and 5th year students.

LOUISIANA: Expanded from first year, first time college students to all undergraduate college students for initial SSIG awards. Louisiana Assn. of Student Financial Aid Administrators recommends to LHEAC an annual formula for determination of continuation awards and initial award amounts for schools. MICHIGAN: Use of both CSS and ACT needs analysis systems. In '77-'78 Legislative Merit Awards Program to award Merit Scholarships to 1,000 top scoring students in the amount of \$1,000 without regard to financial need; also New State Direct Loan Program. MINNESOTA: For-profit post-secondary institutions are eligible for the first time. MISSOURI: Missouri students will make application for MSG directly through ACT/ CSS then MSG will use this information to complete award. In '77-'78 Uniform Methodology will be used. In '78-'79, the Common Form will be adopted. NEBRASKA: Involvement of private-independent institutions in SSIG. '77-'78: None. NEW JERSEY: '76-'77: Complete revision in data processing system is in progress which will supply common data base for all grant and loan programs. New Scholarship Applications to be processed this fall will be the first on the new System Tuition Aid Grant legislation amended to increase income cutoff from \$9,000 to \$13,500. Earlier application notification, applications processed on first come-first serve basis.

OREGON: '76-'77: More complete utilization of data system. '77-'78: All applicants must file Financial Aid Form through CSS; no separate application; complete utilization of data processing of applications and accounting.

PENNSYLVANIA: '76-'77: Reduced in-state maximum award from 80% of tuition and fees not to exceed \$1,200; standard commuter allowance increased; BEOG award amount applied against full-year financial need. '77-'78: Renew effort to increase legislated maximum award and administrative imposed maximum income. ARKANSAS: We began 8/1/76 and will send BEOG applications to all freshmen BEOG eligibles in the State. CALIFORNIA: Yes. Consider BEOG as an award (student resources) to be coordinated. CONNECTICUT: Yes. Receiving solely summary information. DELAWARE: Yes. Cross-Tab for information purposes. FLORIDA: Yes. BEOG eligibility indexes are interfaced with all FSAG applicants. GEORGIA: Yes. BEOG computation is applied to the specific budget (established by this agency) of the institution the student is to attend (acceptance by that institution being a prerequisite to the student's submission of a GIS application). The actual (or very close) amount of the BEOG thus determined is then considered a resource in determining the GIS award. If no BEOG data has been received, the agency makes the same BEOG computation on the basis of CSS information received, using BEOG law. HAWAII: Yes. For information only. For information only. OREGON: Yes. Check against our file to check application for BEOG application status of grantees and to adjust size of need grant. PENNSYLVANIA: Yes. BEOG award is calculated and award value is applied against financial need. Have been denied our request for full BEOG data. RHODE ISLAND: Yes. Data is used for research projects. SOUTH CAROLINA: Yes. BEOG, Tuition Grant Award and family contribution cannot exceed the institutional budget as determined by the Agency. SOUTH DAKOTA: No. We use index eligibility number to determine need. TENNESSEE: Yes. Helpful in determining if applicants have applied for BEOG and in estimating further aid. VERMONT: Yes. We calculate Basic Grant awards for all applicants and use award amount in determining Incentive Grant eligibility. VIRGINIA: Yes. Only informally used. We rely primarily on the institutions to make adjustments in aid packages, if necessary, to accommodate a CSAP award. We do verify that a student is not overawarded total aid by more than \$100. WASHINGTON: Yes. We hope to be able to tie in more directly in near future. Timing continues to be a problem. WEST VIRGINIA: Yes. Agency calculates BEOG award and uses as a resource. Initial State grant reflects BEOG award. WISCONSIN: Yes. Used directly in award calculation. GUAM: Yes. TRUST TERRITORY: Yes. Attempting to calculate basic award by school with other information available to determine basic award from Territory resources.

WHAT IMPACT AND/OR DECISIONS RELATING TO FEDERAL BEOG (BASIC GRANTS) HAS THE AGENCY MADE RELATIVE TO THE 1976-77 AWARD YEAR PROGRAMS?

ALABAMA: Utilize BEOG as needs analysis system (BEOG cumulative tapes-full data). ARKANSAS: We will continue to use the BEOG Eligibility Index as a needs analysis tool for determining award amounts. CALIFORNIA: We have coordinated our awards with BEOG, withdrawing our awards when BEOG meets student need. all or in part. CONNECTICUT: All applicants are encouraged to apply for BEOG awards. FLORIDA: Institutions are requested to make adjustments to our tentative grant awards on the basis of BEOG and aid from outside sources. IDAHO: Financial Aid Officers package SSIG awards with BEOG and other aid programs. ILLINOIS: Agency calculated for each applicant a Basic Grant award eligibility and this award value was considered a resource prior to the calculation of ISSC award. INDIANA: Due to the increase in BEOG awards, we have over-awarded in relation to our appropriation. IOWA: Will adjust awards, when necessary, for students receiving BEOG aid. Also will attempt to forward applications to Iowa filers who appear eligible and who do not appear on the Iowa tape. KANSAS: The State agency and the institutions cooperate to avoid over-awarding as a result of the BEOG and State grant programs. KENTUCKY: KHEAA Grant Program Regulations state that if an applicant is eligible for a BEOG application he must apply prior to disbursement of the spring semester portion of KHEAA grant. MAINE: Students are encouraged to apply for BEOG. MARYLAND: We receive monthly reports and consider all BEOG awards where State grants are need based. MICHIGAN: BEOG awards cause reduction in State awards when the student applicant's need is reduced sufficiently. MINNESOTA: BEOG amounts are considered when the amount of each individual State award is calculated. NEW JERSEY: We receive complete BEOG tape which will be used as the "Application" for Public Tuition Aid. Any student who files BEOG and has an eligibility index of 2,500 or less will be eligible for a grant at a

4-year public college, if full time. NEW YORK: Undergraduate students who claim emancipation are required to apply for BEOG as a condition for receiving a TAP grant. NORTH CAROLINA: Application for a BEOG is a prerequisite for an NCSIG award. NCSIG is meant to be the second step in a package of financial aid for students with "substantial financial need." NORTH DAKOTA: Use BEOG data for research and statistics only, not used in award process. OREGON: No awards made to non-BEOG applicants. Reductions in Need Grants to BEOG recipients total an estimated \$150,000. PENNSYLVANIA: Agency calculated BEOG grants and applies award value against financial need. This does not apply to those attending schools with tuition in excess of \$2,450. RHODE ISLAND: If student demonstrates need, it is assumed that student will apply for BEOG. SOUTH CAROLINA: All students who are potentially eligible are required to apply for BEOG. Tuition Grants Agency computes BEOG eligibility if student fails to apply formally. TENNESSEE: Applicants must apply for BEOG. VERMONT: Implementation of BEOG as a base in determining FY'77 Incentive Grant awards. VIRGINIA: Encourage College Scholarship Assistance Program applicants to apply for BEOG. WASHINGTON: SNG recipients must apply for a Basic Grant. WEST VIRGINIA: Agency calculates BEOG award in package-inserted amount as resource. WISCONSIN: BEOG index is directly used as part of the grant eligibility calculation. AMERICAN SAMOA: All government of American Samoa grant awards will be reduced by the BEOG award. TRUST TERRITORY: Application for BEOG mandatory as a condition of receiving Trust Territory undergraduate assistance. VIRGIN ISLANDS: Agency will continue to (1) sponsor workshops to familiarize counselors with changes in BEOG Program; (2) disseminate information to high school students. Agency is considering determining awards on BEOG awards provided information is obtained early.

HAS THE KEPPEL REPORT (NATIONAL TASK FORCE ON STUDENT AID PROBLEMS) HAD ANY IMPACT ON THE AGENCY'S DECISIONS MADE (TO BE MADE) FOR THE 1976-77 AND/OR 1977-78 AWARD YEARS? IF YES, DESCRIBE:

ARKANSAS: Not yet. The Postsecondary Education Commission, coordinated by DHE has surveyed the State and has a document "Student Aid Problems." Recommendations as a result of this project will affect our program in the future.

CALIFORNIA: Yes, we are using the uniform methodology and student common financial data form and are completing a Master Plan for California to implement Keppel recommendations in California.

COLORADO: Yes. Anticipate attempting to develop centralized financial aid information system for State for '77-'78 year. CONNECTICUT: Yes. We will be assessing a change in financial needs analysis procedure.

FLORIDA: Yes. We are developing student aid application for all post-secondary institutions within the State of Florida. GEORGIA: No yet. A number of areas will be reconsidered during the fall months in respect to the 1977-78 award year, and the Keppel Report may have some bearing upon these areas of consideration.

HAWAII: Yes, we will use the Common Form at <u>all</u> Hawaiian post-secondary institutions. ILLINOIS: Yes. The '77-'78 award year ISSC application will include the original prototype data elements and also calculate a family expectation according to the national consensus model.

IOWA: Yes. Have initiated a Common Form. KENTUCKY: Yes. The Financial Aid Form (CSS version of the Keppel Task Force Common Form) is the application required by KHEAA for its grant programs. MARYLAND: Yes. Moving to use new finan-

cial aid form. MICHIGAN: Yes. Based on Uniform Methodology of need analysis, students may submit either CSS or ACT financial statements. MINNESOTA: Yes. Common form under consid-

eration for '77-'78.

MISSOURI: Yes. In '77-'78 Uniform Methodology will be used. Common Form will be adopted in '78-'79.

NEW JERSEY: Uniform Methodology with minor modifications will be used for all new and renewal applications processed during the 1976-77 year.

NEW YORK: Yes. We have advanced the application period.

NORTH CAROLINA: Yes. Support Uniform Methodology and adoption of a Common Form.

OREGON: Yes. 1) Support decision to adopt uniform application 2) Gave support to BEOG and State Grant Programs.

PENNSYLVANIA: Yes. Styled application form more closely to Common Form. Data collected will permit comparative analysis of expected contribution by PHEAA present method, BEOG, and Uniform Methodology.

SOUTH CAROLINA: Yes. The Common Form will be used in '77-'78.

TEXAS: When ACT/CSS computer analysis not used, hand calculations are done following to the Uniform Methodology.

VERMONT: Yes. Use of Uniform Methodology. VIRGINIA: Yes. The agency may use the Common Form in 1976-77 or 1977-78.

WASHINGTON: Yes. We're encouraging use of a uniform application.

WEST VIRGINIA: Yes. Adopted Uniform Methodology and agency continues to give consideration to Common Form.

WISCONSIN: Yes. Wisconsin has adopted the Common Form, is using consensus need analysis methodology and equity packaging.

TRUST TERRITORY: Yes. Major program change from awarding post-secondary aid on the basis of field of study to selected students, to a program based on need and cooperative packaging with institutions attended by Micronesians.

VIRGIN ISLANDS: Will consider for '77-'78 the possibility of using a general formula for all.

STATES WHOSE AGENCIES HAVE HAD COURT ACTIONS BROUGHT AGAINST THEM IN THE PAST TWO YEARS

ARKANSAS: A private citizen filed suit to enjoin the state from giving funds to private institutions. A hearing in the near future is scheduled.

CALIFORNIA: A suit was filed in small claims court for awards not granted or subsequently withdrawn. The Commission has won each case.

The organization, Americans GEORGIA: United for Separation of Church and State brought suit agains the Independent College Tuition Equalization Grant Program in 1974, claiming the program to be in violation of the U.S. Constitution. The suit was dismissed in 1976 essentially due to lack of prosecution by the plaintiff's attorney.

MINNESOTA: Personnel problem resolved out of court.

MISSOURI: The constitutionality of the MSGP was challenged on the separation of Church and State. The lower court ruled the program unconstitutional, however, the Supreme Court over-turned the lower court's ruling and ruled that the program was "facially' constitutional. NEW YORK: Aliens were requested to apply for citizenship or sign an affidavit of intent to become a citizen. Suit was brought to eliminate the affidavit. The court ruled the affidavit illegal. All resident aliens are now eligible. NORTH CAROLINA: In May of this year the Authority was named as a defendent in a suit which challenged the constitutionality of programs of assistance which provide tax revenues to instituions or to residents who attend those institutions if the institutions are sectarian in nature. The suit Loan program, the North Carolina Student

Incentive Grant program, the North Carolina Legislative Tuition Grant program and the Contractual Program of aid to residents enrolled in North Carolina private colleges. In May, 1976 a hearing was held before a Federal District Judge with respect to the loan portion of the challenge only. The Judge held that there was 'no substantial Federal question' involved with respect to the loan and the plaintiff's period of appeal expired without an appeal to the Fourth Circuit of Appeals. As a practical matter, then, the loan program is free from the suit, having been dismissed by action of the District Court. Further hearings will be held in the Fall with respect to the other three programs with the idea of a final decision being rendered by a three judge panel in April or May of 1977. No injunctive relief was granted the plaintiff and therefore the programs will function for this year until further decision by the court.

PENNSYLVANIA: Hospital Schools of Nursing contesting agency's denial of eligibility for participation in Institutional Assistance Grants Program as independent institutions of higher education. Case is pending before the State Supreme Court.

TENNESSEE: On November 8, 1974, the Tuition Grant Program was declared unconstitutional by a three federal judge panel. In February, 1975, the U.S. Supreme Court granted a stay. After Legislative changes, the U.S. Supreme Court vacated judgement of U.S. District Court and remanded the case to court for reconsideration. Tuition Grant repealed by Tennessee legislature and Assistance Award Program was enacted. The District Court dismissed the old case but Americans United for Separation of Church and challenged the North Carolina Insured Student State have refiled a new suit against the Assistance Award Program, but no trial has been held.

COMMENTS THAT INDIVIDUAL STATES DESIRED TO MAKE WHICH WOULD ALLOW THE READER A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF THE AGENCY:

ALABAMA: There was a 25% reduction in state appropriations from 75-76 to 76-77. Such action in 77-78 would mean the program will meet less than 5% of the need of all applicants.

ARIZONA: The state of Arizona, at this time, has not initiated or funded any form of state student aid program except Board of Regents Scholarships. These are budgeted for and administered by the individual state universities. The Commission will administer the SSIG Program when matching funds are obtained. COLORADO: Colorado uses a decentralized system of administering its students and programs. The Legislature appropriates funds to the Commission which allocates them to public institutions for the use according to Commission guidelines.

GEORGIA: Substantial additional federal funds are needed in the SSIG program. I feel confident that this state will match all federal funds that may be made available by the Congress. IDAHO: The Idaho SSIG program is 'campus based'. Each participating postsecondary educational institution receives an allotment based on total enrollment and full time equivalent. The Financial Aid Officers use this allotment in their student financial aid packaging and submit applications, needs analysis, and recommendation for student awards to this agency.

KENTUCKY: KHEAA's exclusive use of the Kentucky Financial Aid Form appears to have significantly reduced the need for Kentucky students to file different need analysis documents for different state institutions.

LOUISIANA: Although Louisiana was allocated \$617,865 in federal matching funds for 1976-77, the Legislature funded program at same dollar level as 1975-76 with \$279,528 in state matching funds plus administration costs.

MONTANA: Private schools are not eligible to participate in SSIG due to decision by Commission territory is further divided into sub-units er of Higher Education in relation to Montana Constitution. How the state agency. The Education acts as a state agency. The referred to as districts. The six districts are: Yap. Palau, Marshalls, Popape, Truk.

NORTH DAKOTA: Our program was started in 1973 as an incentive program to assist students as they begin their postsecondary education. With that concept, and with limited funding, we haven't as

yet begun a renewal program. Our law states that awards shall be based on the paren't ability to contribute. Since our program is relatively small, it has been our intent to keep the administrative procedures to a minimum. Our agency acts in support of and as an assistant to institutions.

PENNSYLVANIA: State appropriation frozen at \$68.4 million for three years. Only new resource has been SSIG. Front loading BEOG awards has helped prevent major eligibility revisions to state program. Full effect of BEOG reached this year; 5,500 late applicants not being processed in state grant program. The 75-76 level appeared to be down because of a \$1.1 million transfer of matching funds to student grants in 74-75.

VERMONT: In FY 77 faced with a level funded state appropriation for the third year in succession and a 12% increase in on-time applicants. By counting BEOG as an initial source we raised our levels of assistance by \$500 but our average grant is \$100 lower than FY 76.

WISCONSIN: 1976-77 brought significant changes in program and we are awaiting evaluation.

WYOMING: Council will attempt for a fourth time to pass a state student aid bill in the state legislature in January, 1977. AMERICAN SAMOA: The Government of American Samoa's Scholarship Program is primarily intended to provide an opportunity for American Samoans to receive off-island training.

TRUST TERRITORY: Residents of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands are accorded unique status as non-immigrant students. The Headquarters Department of Education acts as a state agency. The territory is further divided into sub-units referred to as districts. The six districts are: Yap, Palau, Marshalls, Ponape, Truk, and Kusaie. The Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas was formerly the Marianas District but is now governed separately.
