Beginning with the 1974-75 academic year, the federal State Student Incentive Grant Program (SSIGP) provided funds to assist in the establishment of new and the expansion of existing State Student Scholarship/Grant Programs based upon financial need for at least half-time study in undergraduate programs.

Growth represented since 1974-75 in the historical summary table above, to a large degree, is a response to the new SSIG Program which permits up to a \$1,500 annual student award (equal shares of \$750 federal/state) in this new form of state/federal partnership.

COMMENTS TO AID SURVEY READERS TO BETTER UNDERSTAND
YOUR AGENCY'S 1980-81 POSITION

State	
Alabama	Faced with insufficient income to meet the demand for education dollars, the legislature reduced grant funding in 1980-81 to the point that only 52% of allotted SSIG dollars will be matched.
Colorado	We continue to operate a decentralized program relying extensively upon higher education institutions for program administration.
Connecticut	We intend to submit legislation to the 1981 legislature which would consolidate state student aid programs.
Delaware	This is the second year of operation for this program under centralized administration.
Florida	Approximately one out of five timely, eligible, needy applicants are awarded.
Georgia	SSIG program in Georgia is still underfunded. First priority is to secure full funding of this program.
Idaho	The state of Idaho is experiencing a rather dramatic loss in revenue, necessitating a holdback of state general account money. The SSIG has been assessed a holdback of \$2,600 so far. Any holdback of state matching funds can be made up with institutional matching funds.
Illinois	Limiting \$1,900 maximum to only those students with extensive financial need. About 13,000 applicants who would have applied after September 15, 1980, for 1980-81 will not be assisted.
Indiana	Our Agency did not have adequate funding to full fund grants or freedom of choice for the 1980-81 academic year. Freedom of choice was funded at 75% per student award and grants ranged from a 35% to a 75% funding level per student based upon TFC categories.
Iowa	State is faced with a mandatory 3.6% cut in funds. Further prospects for additional funding for 1981-82 are not good. Agency will temporarily be in a status quo position.
Kentucky	Projected shortfall in state revenue necessitates budget cuts throughout state government. The KHEAA budget must be reduced by \$400,000 for the current fiscal year. Thus, some agency services have been reduced or cut altogether. Student grants have not been reduced. However, no school changes are being processed for the spring semester. Major data processing changes have been postponed for a year, and mass mailing of FAFs to high school seniors by KHEAA has been discontinued for 1980-81.
Maryland	1980-81 is our first year of total year computer services, so we will be happy after such transition year. No major problems but a lot of hard work.
Massachusetts	First year of change from portability to reciprocity. Separate awards for nursing eliminated; now part of general scholarship.
Michigan	Competitive scholarships had a \$6,000,000 shortfall. All awards reduced by \$250 per recipient. No funds available for late tuition grant awards; such awards have been made in most years.
Minnesota	General state budget reductions. Lost funds to replace BEOG reductions in order to save data processing. Create other savings from other programs. The scholarship and grant expenditures are reported to MHECB in lump sum in many cases. For the purpose of this survey, this total expenditure figure has been divided into 42% for scholarships for 1980-81 and 58% for grants for 1980-81.

Nebraska	This agency acts in the capacity of a state coordinating agency with advisors, not governing authority. It also serves as the state 1202 commission and/or the administration of federal grants and passthrough funds. The agency addresses specific studies mandated by the legislature and develops studies and reports as it deems necessary to provide a statewide perspective of postsecondary education. The total agency budget over \$1 million with only \$75,000 appropriated by the state for operation.
Nevada	Nevada only has SSIG and operates on alternation matching structure. No state appropriation currently. Facing Proposition 13 type problem in near future.
New Jersey	Under restraining management and fiscal controls following a substantial 1979-80 overexpenditure.
North Carolina	With respect to the loan program, we have simply been inundated with applications. The grant programs have been operating smoothly for several years.
Ohio	Because of reduced state revenues, the state budget has been reduced 3% across the board. Another 5% cut is expected in January, 1981. An 8% cut in the OIG program may result in reductions of some students' awards.
Oregon	In the 1979-81 biennium the state of Oregon was short \$204 million in revenue, causing reductions in state expenditures. As a result, grant amounts were frozen at 1979-80 levels, and the application/award criteria were adjusted to make available funds cover the eligible pool of students.
Pennsylvania	Appropriation increase has not been sufficient to permit program adjustments in order to offset inflationary increases in income. This has resulted in rejection of an increasing percentage of applicants.
Rhode Island	RIHEAA has been phasing out an old scholarship program one year at a time and phasing in a new scholarship and grant program. 1980-81 seniors will be the last class covered by the old program.
South Carolina	2,000 eligible students have applied but not received awards for 1980-81.
South Dakota	State funding is very low due to a lack of general fund revenues. The state has increased tax rates, broadened the tax base, and has cut budgets without being successful in meeting a lack of tax revenue. The state cannot go into debt. Many programs are not being funded as a result.
Vermont	In fiscal year 1981 we receive an 11% increase in applicants which is lowering our level of assistance by \$100.
Virginia	Although funding for the CSAP was not increased for the 1980-81 academic year, the number of applicants has increased by some 7,000. As a result, the number of students assisted and the size of awards offered have decreased.

Alabama	- Due to the fact that educational demands are increasing at a greater rate than tax income, only 52% of the allotted SSIG fund for 1980-81 will be matched.
Alaska	- State loan program is not related or dependent in any way upon federal funds.
Arkansas	- We are seeking a rather large increase in state funding to accommodate our legislative recommendation of an increase in the maximum from \$300-\$900.
Colorado	- Not necessarily, but increased federal funds are likely to result in decreased state funds.

Georgia	- Probably not to any appreciable degree. At the present time, our SSIG funds are overmatched. Due to problems with the economy, it is difficult to determine future possibilities.
Hawaii	- Depends on the fiscal resources of the state and the program priorities established by the executive and legislative branches of government.
Idaho	- The State Board of Education has requested more state matching funds from the legislature, but with present revenue projections, the prognosis is not good.
Illinois	- Modest increases anticipated.
Indiana	- This will be discussed by the legislature this year. It seems the general opinion is "no." In order to fully fund our programs presently, with no cutback in federal funds, we need additional funds. It does not seem reasonable to assume the state would be receptive to picking up a cutback from the federal government at this time.
Iowa	- Although Iowa may be in for a year or two of retrenchment, the trend in student aid appropriations has been steadily upward for the past ten years.
Kansas	- Our state has been modest in its programs, but has provided reasonable increases each year.
Kentucky	- Uncertain.
Maine	- State does not care about federal funds. At present level.
Maryland	- Federal SSIG is a good motivation for increased state effort and passage of new state legislation as needed.
Massachusetts	- Despite our historical underfunding, it is becoming more difficult to receive increases in legislative appropriations. This year, we were essentially level funded.
Michigan	- The future state economic fortunes are very unclear and unstable due in a large part to auto industry problems.
Minnesota	- Dependent upon general state revenue situation.
Missouri	- Already greatly overmatched by state funds.
Nebraska	- Currently, the state of Nebraska does not appropriate an amount equal to match the federal SSIG allotment. Those state owned or controlled institutions receive an amount that is designated for SSIG matching. However, this is incorporated in their budgets and no separate or direct appropriation is made for the federal SSIG program in total.
New Jersey	- State funding is controlled by the annual appropriations cycle. Additional funds tend to be approved as a result of tuition increases and general cost of education increases.
New Mexico	- Possibly.
North Carolina	- This state is required to operate on a balanced budget. We do not print "funny money." We must live within the limits of our financial capabilities. It is not likely that higher education will get an increasing share of scarce tax revenues in the near term.
North Dakota	- With inflation and a statewide crop failure, it is unlikely that any agency will be given an increase. Our state does not like to have the heavy hammer of the federal government requiring more state expenditures with the ultimate possibility that the "soft" money will dig up and leave the states holding the entire bag.
Oregon	- At the present time, the state's fiscal position is not good. All agencies have experienced a 15% reduction in state funds for 1980-81. However, the trend in higher education financing appears to be one of "high tuition, high financial aid." As tuition increases to keep up with inflation in the cost of instruction, increases in state supported financial aid appear likely to offset these cost increases for needy students.
Pennsylvania	- After four years of level state funding (1974-75 to 1979-80) modest increases (averaging 4%) were received during each of the last two years. Continued increases may be forthcoming regardless; however, increased federal funds requiring a state match would enhance the likelihood of increased state funds.
Rhode Island	- Not necessarily.
South Dakota	- A shortfall in government revenues will continue a "tight money" appropriation situation for the next three to four years unless economic conditions improve. Most programs will be happy to survive the problem, let alone see any significant funding increases.
Vermont	- Depends on state revenues.
Virginia	- The increases in funding we anticipate will reflect inflation but little else. In effect, funding will remain constant. Increased federal funds (through SSIG) would be matched through the overmatch found in the current appropriation.
West Virginia	- Contingent on state revenues and increases in student charges. Funding could "level off" if state financial picture remains uncertain.
Wisconsin	- Wisconsin, like most states, is having fiscal problems. How changes in federal funding would impact the state depends on "strings" and state's fiscal situation at that time.
Wyoming	- The state has no grant programs.

- Alabama - Prefer balance at present. If continuous charges and proposed changes could be eliminated for a period of time, the current could possibly be good.
- Colorado - Prefer States assuming more responsibility.
- Hawaii - Each State has its own unique problems/requirements/needs and should be given the flexibility to correct its problems and determine its needs without too much federal direction and control.
- Illinois - Our State purposes are not necessarily the same as federal purposes.
- Iowa - Federal contracts fail to allow for the vast differences among state programs and priorities. Federal direction creates a paperwork overload and unnecessary administrative expense at both State and Federal levels.
- Maine - Feds too positive. States need more flexibility.
- Maryland - The Federal has not yet motivated States and institutions to put forth reasonable aid efforts. The Federal far outweighs the other.
- Michigan - Currently the Feds are calling most, if not all of the shots, which needs to be altered to provide greater "outside" participation.
- Minnesota - State policy is designed for an effective partnership which we believe should involve less prescriptive regulation.
- Nebraska - It is receptive to more Federal funds with less Federal control.
- New Jersey - Federal programs should continue as a National base with each State assuming responsibility for additional programs based on its own needs and commitments.
- North Dakota - We know far better than the Feds what unique needs our State has, and what solutions may work. Let the Feds use the BEOG for their ends, and let us use SEOG, CWSP, NDSL, SSIG to further our needs.
- Oregon - States such as our are committed to aiding our students and have a better understanding of the need for funds and how they should be distributed.
- Pennsylvania - Impact of direct funding of students through BEOG and increasing BEOG per student is impacting on state determination of its higher education offering - should be more federal support directly to State Student Aid Program.
- Rhode Island - Federal program tends to be formula oriented rather than real need oriented e.g. BEOG off-campus allowance of \$1,100 for living expenses.
- South Dakota - We must remember the "Golden Rule"- he who has the gold makes the rules. Changes from the HEA reauthorization address many state concerns and we are satisfied with the federal/state balance as found in law.
- Texas - Our stand on the "All non-profit institutions" issue is an example.
- Washington - The balance is good but the States could provide more assistance in the FISAP process by conducting studies concerning distribution and utilization of funds, aggregate need by State and awarding of supplemental funds.
- Wisconsin - State's should administer the BEOG Program.
- Wyoming - States, based on local requirements should have more control over where funds go.

Minnesota	-	From the schools there are mixed reactions to this question.
Missouri	-	The schools in our State are not certain how they feel about this issue.
North Dakota	-	Schools would prefer to strengthen the campus based program with the State Agency as a support system.
Oregon	-	Schools would prefer fewer outside controls with the schools being responsible for delivering Aid to students based on their own priorities.
Pennsylvania	-	Increased flexibility for the Financial Aid Officer.
Rhode Island	-	Maybe some variation between Private and Public Schools.

Iowa	ICAC contracts with ACT for data processing. The change in forms and the impact of a central processor will likely be significant.
Kansas	If state agency overprints on applications becomes a problem, then we'll have problems. If that topic is resolved, then no problems. The impact on the analysis may be great but no way of knowing now.
Kentucky	Reevaluate our application procedure.
Maine	We get good service from the College Scholarship Service. Federal program will be too inflexible. All states will have to do it their way. With small amount of money available, states may get out and go own way.
Maryland	Would mean more applications, but perhaps greater difficulty in controlling the timing of applications and in seeking the unique student information needed for our many state programs.
Massachusetts	There will be an impact on our operation whether we decide to use this format or not.

West Virginia	Unless there will be space available to incorporate state questions, it will necessitate reinstituting separate agency application forms. The adoption of the BEOG computing over the UM would directly impact on eligibility for state aid both in terms of eligible students and dollars required.
Wisconsin	Impact uncertain since federal plans and services to state are unknown at this time.

MULTIPLE DATA ENTRY PARTICIPATION

Currently, Pennsylvania is the only state involved in Multiple Data Entry as an official MDE processor under contract with Basic Grants. In answer to the question "do you anticipate participating in the next three years" Connecticut answers "we will participate only if the Feds mandate that the BEOG needs analysis be used for the Federal campus-based programs" and the other respondents either checked "No" or left the question blank. All states using CSS, ACT, or Basic Grant applications to drive their state programs are participating in Multiple Data Entry in a passive way, but there is apparently little sentiment for active participation outside of Pennsylvania in the near future.
