Dear Colleague:

I am pleased to provide you with the 1995-96 Annual Survey Report of the National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs (NASSGAP).

The report chronicles the variety of need-based and merit-based aid provided by states to undergraduates and graduates for both full-time and part-time study. These programs include important partnership programs with the federal government, such as State Student Incentive Grants (SSIG), Robert C. Byrd Scholarships, and the National Early Intervention Scholarship and Partnership (NEISP) Program. Without that federal support, many states would be unable to provide any postsecondary student aid at all.

Overall expenditures for State student aid increased in 1995-96 by 1.6% with over 2 million students served, but this reflects a slowing of the growth trend. New state and federal commitments, especially through partnerships, are essential to maintaining access to higher education for all who can benefit.

I want to thank the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation for conducting the report survey and compiling the results.

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The National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs (NASSGAP) released its 27th Annual Survey Report, highlighting that more than \$2.9 billion was spent by states for student aid at the postsecondary level in 1995-96, a 1.6% increase from the previous year.

Over 2 million students benefitted from this assistance, with 85% of the dollar total awarded as need-based aid to undergraduate and graduate students. Another 15% was provided on merit and other special bases to undergraduate and graduate students.

Five states (California, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania) collectively awarded \$1.5 billion in undergraduate need-based aid, comprising 60% of the total awarded in this category.

Overall, state spending on need-based and non-need-based grant aid to undergraduate and graduate students increased 52% over the past 5 years. More than 4 of every 5 states reported a 5 year increase.

The report also showed that funding for undergraduate needbased aid levelled off in 1995-96, increasing only 0.6% from 1994-95, breaking a five year trend of annual increases averaging 9.6%. It also reports that state-funded student aid declined by more than 10% for five states between 1994-95 and 1995-96.

"Clearly, states are trying to keep access open to higher education, but the funding demands from other social programs are also evident," noted Scott Freedman, NASSGAP President. "If it weren't for the support provided by federal matching programs such as the State Student Incentive Grant (SSIG) and the National Early Intervention Scholarship and Partnership (NEISP) programs, Many more states would have shown a decline in state funding," Mr. Freedman noted. "Those federal funds aren't large numbers (only \$53 million for both in FY'97) but they have an incredible 'magnet' effect on state student aid funds." I urge the Congress to strengthen the federal/state student aid partnership by adding

funding to those important programs."

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Executive Summary

The National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs (NASSGAP) is pleased to present its 27th Annual Survey Report of state-administered student financial aid available for the 1995-96 academic year.

This year's report, the second compiled and published by the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC), offers a wealth of information and statistics such as basic program information and funding levels, longitudinal indicators of student aid funding, and comparisons of student financial aid available in each of the 52 states (Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico included) and the Nation. The data and tables contained in the Report represent actual 1995-96 academic year data.

In an effort to improve the readability of the Report, the aid category "Other Aid Available" has been presented as a separate table in this year's report rather than including it with "Total Grant Aid Awarded by State Grant Programs."

Student Aid Highlights

- In the 1995-96 academic year, the states awarded \$2.914 billion in need and non-need based student grant aid to over 2 million students, an increase of 1.6% over the \$2.869 billion awarded in 1994-95. Of the amount awarded, 85% was need-based grant aid to undergraduate and graduate students, while 15% of it was non-need-based grant aid to undergraduates and graduates. These percentages vary slightly from the 86% and 14% awarded, respectively, in 1994-95.
- Of the \$2.5 billion in need-based grant aid available, 99% went to undergraduates and of the \$0.5 billion in non-need-based grant aid awarded, 95% was awarded to undergraduates.
- Five states (California, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania) collectively awarded more than \$1.5 billion in undergraduate need-based grant aid, comprising 60% of the total awarded in this category.
- Overall, state spending on need and non-need based grant aid to undergraduates and graduates has increased 51.9% over the past five years (see Table Two). 85% of the states (44) reported an increase in these categories while only 15% (8) reported a decrease.
- ♦ Ten states reported an increase in need-based grant aid to undergraduates of more than 10% over 1994-95. These states were Arkansas (+ \$1.86 million), Colorado (+ \$2.82 million), Delaware (+ \$0.15 million), Maine (+ \$1.20 million), Maryland (+ \$5.78 million), Nebraska (+ \$0.39 million), North Carolina (+ \$2.89 million), Texas (+ \$11.67 million), Virginia (+ \$5.68 million), and West Virginia (+ \$1.37 million). Five states reported a decrease in funding of more than 10%. These states were Arizona (- \$1.19 million), Hawaii (- \$0.23 million), Massachusetts (- \$7.28 million), New Hampshire (- \$0.66 million), and New Jersey (- \$27.30 million).
- Funding for undergraduate need-based grant aid leveled off in the 1995-96 academic year, increasing only 0.6% from 1994-95. It had increased at an average of 9.6% yearly in each of the previous five academic years (see Table Nine).

Comments to Better Understand Agency Responses, 1995-96

<u>Arkansas</u>

The 1995 session of the legislature raised the basic award amount for the Academic Challenge Scholarship to \$1,500 per year, and added a \$500 incentive award. For each academic year that the awardee has a cumulative GPA of 3.0, the award is increased by \$500 for the following academic year. This means a potential award of \$3,000 in the 4th year.

Florida

The Florida Teacher Scholarship & Forgivable Loan (FTS&FL) Program consists of the following two programs: The "Chappie" James Most Promising Teacher Scholarship Program and The Florida Critical Teacher Shortage Forgivable Loan Program. Although the FTS & FL consists of two student financial aid programs, the FTS & FL receives a single appropriation covering both programs.

Georgia

Two new programs were funded by the Lottery: HOPE Teacher Scholarship and PROMISE Scholarship. HTS is for graduate degrees in education, PROMISE is for undergrad education degrees. Both are forgivable loans by teaching.

Illinois

The Illinois Monetary Award Program (MAP) provides need-based grant aid to cover tuition and fee costs for students who enroll on at least a half-time basis, i.e., six credit hours. With the beginning of the 1993-94 school year, Federal Pell Grant eligibility was extended to students enrolled on a less than a half-time basis. In Illinois, some members of the higher education community now question whether MAP eligibility should be broadened to include students enrolled for fewer than six hours. Currently ISAC is in the final stages of a study of students who enroll on a less than half-time basis. As a part of this evaluation, a consortium of postsecondary institutions have developed a pilot grant program for students who enroll for fewer than six hours. The evaluation of this pilot program will provide valuable insight into the benefits and costs of providing aid to less than half-time students.

<u>Indiana</u>

The Contract for Space Program is a Tuition Equalization program, neither need nor merit is a factor. Awards for the Minority Teacher/Special Education Services Scholarship program are based on applicants ethnicity or program of study. Neither need nor merit is considered in factoring awards.

<u>Maryland</u>

1995-96 was the first year of awards in the Educational Excellence Award Program. This program replaces the General State Scholarship Program.

Michigan

Appropriations and expenditures in the Competitive Scholarship Program (CSP) and the Tuition Grant Program (TGP) pose problems for statistical reports. Part I, Page 1, identifies appropriations and Part V identifies actual expenditures. Our TGP appropriation supplements awards in the CSP, so dollars paid out in CSP are higher than appropriation. The TGP dollars paid out are less than appropriation as the difference is paid to CSP recipients. When identifying increases or decreases in funding levels for states, Part I should be used.

Montana

Montana University System provides High School Honor Scholarships to Montana residents which can be used at any of the MUS campuses. It is awarded by the High School to eligible students in the top 25% of the graduating class, with a cap on the number of awards per high school based on their total enrollment. However no cumulative figures are kept on the total dollars awarded. Each award covers tuition at the chosen school.

Nevada

There is no central financial aid agency in Nevada. The University and Community College System of Nevada Chancellor's office sets financial aid policy for the Nevada Student Access Program which is funded by 1/2 of all fee increases and additional State allocated dollars.

New Jersey

NJOSA implemented several refinements to policies, procedures, and student notices which made programs more service oriented. Those changes included allowing institutional officials to exercise professional judgment in determining eligibility under certain circumstances and making the State regulations for satisfactory academic progress mirror the federal regulations. Award values were increased to reflect prior year tuition at public institutions with comparable increases for students at independent institutions.

New Mexico

Prior to the 1995-96 year the CHE contracted the administration of the financial aid programs to an outside source. Effective July 1, 1995, all financial aid administrative functions were brought in-house (into the NMCHE) to facilitate better management of the programs and increase service to students. A new unit was formed, Financial Aid & Student Services, that manages all aspects of State funded financial aid and provides extensive postsecondary consumer support/information for New Mexico's current and prospective students and their families.

New York

Effective with the 1995-96 school year, students in 2-year programs (Associate Degree programs) are limited to three years of eligibility for State awards. Incarcerated students are no longer eligible for awards. Maximum awards at public universities and colleges were limited to 90% of tuition as compared to 100% in previous years.

North Carolina

Overall, the State's commitment to fund student aid increased 5.6% over 1994-95, exclusive of student loan programs.

Ohio

Ohio's largest need-based grant program (Ohio Instructional Grants) continues to assess need on the basis of family income and the number of dependents in the family. There is some interest in the financial aid community with regard to incorporating a need-analysis model.

The State Board of Regents has statutory responsibility for recommending the size of the State appropriations for Ohio's programs. The Director of the State Grants and Scholarships Department at the Ohio Student Aid Commission makes recommendations directly to the Regents each biennium.

Oregon

The Oregon Legislature adopted a new program, State Grant Supplemental Award, specifically targeted for private college students. It is important to note that this program replaces funds that private college students would have lost because of tax reduction measures.

Pennsylvania

Under the Agency's authority to announce awards when an appropriation level has not been determined by March15, the eligibility announcements that begin in mid-May were based on the Governor's recommended appropriation level of a 17 percent increase to the prior year State Grant appropriation. However, the increase ultimately was set at 13 percent over the prior year, which was significant and extremely helpful to students but which resulted in the reprocessing of the entire student file in mid-Summer to adjust awards to the appropriation level. While awarding formula changes were maintained, the maximum award for in-state was reduced from the anticipated \$2,700 to \$2,632, with out-of-state awards also adjusted. Part-time students for the first time became eligible to participate in the State Grant Program in 1994-95. However, this participation was restricted to applicants with PHEAA-adjusted incomes below \$15,000. Effective with the 1995-96 academic year, the income cap limitation was removed and all students could be considered for the part-time program.

Rhode Island

RIHEAA's FY96 appropriation was \$8.3 million below the appropriation we should have received based on a legislated formula that has not been adhered to since FY89. This resulted in an average '95-96 award of \$557 which is 51% lower than our historically highest average of \$1,074 in FY91.

South Carolina

\$2.2 million of \$17.6 State appropriation was "one time", non-recurring dollars. Although the funding level in 1995-96 was \$1.2 million higher than in 1994-95, the percentage of tuition and fees being covered by the grant dropped to an all-time low of 24% in 1995-96.

Texas

We continue to experience a proliferation of new programs. We have four in start-up this biennium - scholarships in accounting; tuition and/or fee exemptions for early high school graduates and students in AFDC in their senior year of high school. The fourth new program is the ROTC program.

Vermont

VSAC is a comprehensive agency that provides career counseling and financial aid information to middle schools, high schools, and adult students. VSAC provides grant programs for students enrolled in full-time, part-time, and non-degree courses and programs. VSAC also serves guarantor for Vermont's students and institutions, and provides loan capital through its Education Loan Finance Program.

Washington

Workforce Training Funds are being reported for the first time.

<u>West Virginia</u>

The 1995-96 academic year was the third year of a five year funding improvement plan for the Program. The current year allocation of \$1.555 million was the first to equal or exceed the level outlined in the plan.

Wyoming

Decentralized system - no data maintained at Commission level.

Puerto Rico

Legislative Grant is the matching State source for SSIG. Funds are matched \$1 per \$1. The Supplementary AID Program is administered by the State University (University of Puerto Rico) and is therefore available only for UPR students.
