Dear Colleague:

I am pleased to provide you with the 1997-98 Annual Survey Report of the National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs (NASSGAP).

The Report chronicles the variety of need-based and merit-based aid provided by states to undergraduates and graduates for both full-time and part-time study. These programs include important partnership programs with the federal government, such as the Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnerships (LEAP – formerly State Student Incentive Grants), Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarships, and the Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP – formerly the National Early Intervention Scholarship and Partnership Program). Without that federal support, many states would be unable to provide any significant postsecondary student assistance or provide the information about postsecondary educational opportunities to disadvantaged students.

Overall expenditures for State student aid increased in 1997-98 by 9.7%, with over two million students served. The growth rate for need-based undergraduate student aid was 7.6%, up from the 4.1% increase reported last year due, in part, to a \$20 million increase in SSIG/LEAP federal funding. In order to maintain access to higher education for all who can benefit, new state and federal commitments, especially through partnerships, are essential.

I want to give special thanks to the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation for conducting the Report survey and compiling the results.

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Executive Summary

The National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs (NASSGAP) is pleased to present its 29th Annual Survey Report of state-administered student financial aid available for the 1997-98 academic year.

This year's report, the fourth compiled and published by the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC), offers information and statistics such as basic program information and expenditures, longitudinal indicators of student aid funding, and comparisons of student financial aid available in each of the 52 states and territories (Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico included). The data and tables contained in the Report represent actual 1997-98 academic year data (unless otherwise noted).

Federal funding of the State Student Incentive Grant, now known as the Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership (LEAP) Program, improved considerably for the 1997-98 academic year. Federal funding for this program went from \$31.4 million in the 1996-97 academic year to \$51.3 million in the 1997-98 academic year, a \$20 million or 63% increase. The SSIG/LEAP program is a dollar- for- dollar federal/state matching program designed to enable states to offer need-based grant aid to students to attend postsecondary education institutions.

Student Aid Highlights

- ♦ In the 1997-98 academic year, the states awarded \$3.389 billion in need and non-need-based student grant aid to more than two million students, an increase of 9.7% in expenditures over the \$3.090 billion awarded in 1996-97. Of the amount awarded, 82% was need-based grant aid to undergraduate and graduate students, while 18% of it was non-need-based grant aid to undergraduates and graduates. These percentages show a slight change from the 84% and 16% awarded, respectively, in 1996-97.
- Funding for undergraduate need-based grant aid increased 7.6% in the 1997-98 academic year over 1996-97. This increase is higher than the 4.1% increase from 1995-96 to 1996-97, but is still below the average increase of 10.0% yearly over each of the five academic years prior to 1995-96 (a time period when SSIG/LEAP was funded at higher levels see Table Nine).
- ♦ Of the \$2.8 billion in need-based grant aid available, 99% went to undergraduates; and, of the \$0.6 billion in non-need-based grant aid awarded, 92% was awarded to undergraduates.
- Five states (California, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania) collectively awarded \$1.6 billion in undergraduate need-based grant aid, comprising 59% of the total awarded in this category.
- ♦ Over the past five years, state spending (in current dollars) on need and non-need based grant aid to undergraduate and graduate/professional students has increased 50.6% (see Table Two). From 1996-97 to 1997-98, 83% of the states (43) reported an increase in these categories, while only 13% (7) reported a decrease.
- ★ Twenty two states reported an increase in need-based grant aid to undergraduates of more than 10% over 1996-97. These states were Aiabama (+ \$.32 million), Alaska (+ \$.03 million), Arizona (+ \$0.41 million), California (+ \$26.87 million), Colorado (+ \$3.43 million), Connecticut (+ \$6.06 million), Delaware (+ \$0.33 million), Hawaii (+ \$0.21 million), Louisiana (+ \$1.02 million), Maine (+ \$1.07 million), Massachusetts (+ \$16.93 million), Mississippi (+ \$0.53 million), Montana (+ \$0.14 million), Nebraska (+ \$0.88 million), Nevada (+ \$2.72 million), New Hampshire (+ \$0.66 million), North Carolina (+ \$4.97 million), Oklahoma (+ \$2.36 million), Texas (+ \$17.91 million), Washington (+ \$1.28 million), West Virginia (+ \$1.61 million), and Wyoming (+ \$0.04 million). Two states reported a decrease in funding of more than 10%. These states were Georgia (- \$1.11 million) and South Dakota (- \$0.35 million). This compares to only thirteen states reporting 10% or higher increases in the prior year.
- Reporting agencies also administered over \$9.8 billion in other aid (e.g., student loans, work-study, scholarships see Table Three). This is a slight increase (3.4%) over the \$9.5 billion awarded in 1996-97. States also reported \$1.9 billion in aid awarded by other State agencies, a 17.5% increase (+\$.278 million) over 1996-97.

Need Based Undergraduate Grant Aid by State 1997-98




Table One Grant Aid Awarded by Responding Agencies 1997-98




Table Two Distribution of Need-Based Undergraduate Aid 1997-98




Table Three Actual 1992-93, 1994-95, & 1997-98 Grant Aid Awarded







Table Four Federal SSIG Funding Levels 1992-93 to 1997-98 Academic Years

Comments to Better Understand Agency Responses, 1997-98

California

The California Student Aid Commission received \$10.2 million in new funds in the 1997-98 State budget to expand the Cal Grant Programs. Five million of the new funding amount was allocated to increase the maximum award levels for new (first-time) 1997-98 Cal Grant A and B recipients attending independent colleges and proprietary schools. The additional funds will increase the maximum award to \$8,184. The last time the maximum award was increased for the Cal Grant A and B programs was for the 1996-97 academic year.

The remaining \$5.2 million increase funded approximately 5,056 additional new awards, equalizing the number of Cal Grant A and B awards for 1997-98 at 19,260 each, for a total of 40,609 awards. Bringing the Cal Grant A and B awards to parity meant an additional 234 Cal Grant A awards and 3,682 new Cal Grant B awards. Academic year 1996-97 was the last time that the number of authorized new awards had been increased.

Connecticut

The two state programs which receive the greatest funding (CICS and CAPS) are campus-based because the public and private colleges in the state (having a vested interest) lobby strongly for funding for these two programs.

Delaware

Merit-based increase for Scholarship Incentive (ScIP) Grant is restricted to undergraduate students.

Georgia

The Scholarship for Engineering Education was a new program beginning with 1997-98. It is for students studying engineering at private colleges in Georgia. It is a loan that is cancelable by working as an engineer in Georgia.

Louisiana

The Louisiana Tuition Assistance Plan (TAP) and the Louisiana Honors Scholarship Programs were terminated at the conclusion of the 1997-98 award year. Recipients who maintained their eligibility were continued as Opportunity Award Level and Performance Award Level, respectively, in the Tuition Opportunity Program For Students (TOPS). The TOPS Teacher Award was initiated in 1997-98. This is a loan forgiveness program to attract academically talented students to elementary and secondary education and to encourage them to begin their teaching careers in Louisiana. The loan amounts are \$8,000 annually for students who are qualified to teach math or chemistry, \$4,000 for other teaching disciplines. These loans are forgiven on a one-year of teaching for one-year of loan basis. The repayment basis is increased for teaching in certain designated areas.

Minnesota

1997-98 was the first year the FM EFC for an independent student without dependents was prorated to 80% within the State Grant award calculation to provide relief to independent students whose income is highly assessed within the FM.

South Carolina

In the 1997-98 fiscal year, the South Carolina General Assembly earmarked \$23 million generated from the Barnwell low-level nuclear waste facility revenues for higher education scholarships, eventually to be divided 50%/50% between need-based and merit-based programs. Of the \$23 million, 17.8% (\$4,094,000) was designated for SC independent college students, and 82.2% (\$18,906,000) was designated for SC public college students. For 1997-98, SC independent college student funds were divided \$3.072 million for need-based grants (through the SC Tuition Grants Program) and \$1.021 million for merit-based grants through the SC Palmetto Fellows Program.

Washington

Washington's aid programs are run in a semi-decentralized manner with strong centralized student eligibility criteria coupled with allocations to institutions. The schools function as agents of the program to identify and serve students within the confines of available funding.

West Virginia

The 1997-98 academic year was the fifth year of a five-year funding improvement plan for the Program. Funding from general revenue was increased by \$1.5 million. In addition, a \$3 million one-time allocation from surplus lottery funds was approved in 1996-97. The funds were evenly apportioned \$1.5 million between 1996-97 and 1997-98. The \$7.5 million five year funding improvement plan was attained. Policy change relative to the awarding of the HERF Funds. Since those funds have historically been contributed by the public sector, decision was rendered to limit use of the funds to only recipients at the public sector.

Wisconsin

Awards are denied to those who are delinquent in court-ordered child support payments.

Wyoming

Decentralized system - no data maintained at Commission level.
